<u>Lot no. 1</u> **Karl Bodmer** (1808 - 1893)

Karl Bodmer was a Swiss-born artist who apprenticed for 10 years with prominent Zurich engraver Johann Jakob Meier. Hired by naturalist Prince Maximilian of Wied to illustrate his travels in America from 1832-1834, Bodmer ultimately reached the upper waters of the Missouri River. He painted portraits of famous Indian chiefs in their natural setting as well as many ceremonies and landscapes. He is known for his uncanny accuracy and detail.

During a five-month stay at Fort Clark near the Mandan Villages in 1833-1834, Máhchsi-Karéhde (Flying War Eagle) was a frequent visitor to the lodges of Prince Maximilian and Karl Bodmer. Bodmer painted multiple full-length portraits of him posed in fine clothing that identified him as an important man and successful warrior. His bear claw necklace, eagle wing fan, and painted robe all reflect his status.

Lot no. 2 Michael Evetts



The double-edged Dag, or dagger, was a popular style of English knife marketed by the Hudson Bay Company beginning in the late 18th century. It remained a trade item into the late 1800's. Its main use was as a fearsome weapon in combat. This reproduction is hand made with a cherry handle. Historic examples used wood or horn, often with extensive brass and copper inlays, rivets, and washers. As trade items, these knives were quite expensive relative to other cutlery. The leather sheath is hand made, and uses a thong as a means of attachment to a belt or sash. The wood case can be displayed horizontally or vertically. A lock is provided to prevent the case being opened when vertical.

Michael J. Evetts is a retired geologist/paleontologist with a long-time interest in the history of the fur trade and western history in general.

In 1952, he and his family moved to Pinedale, Wyoming where he graduated from Pinedale High School in 1958 and received a B.S. degree from the University of Wyoming in 1963, with a major in Mathematics and a minor in Art. After working for eight years as a computer programmer and systems analyst for the State of Montana, he began painting full time in 1971. Tucker and his wife, Jean, returned to live on the Hoback Rim, 30 miles north of Pinedale, Wyoming in 1993. Their home is at the foot of the Wind River Mountains from which he draws inspiration. 

During the Rocky Mountain fur trade of the 1820s and 1830s, mountain men gained extensive knowledge of the American West. In the 1840s, emigrant wagon trains formed heading west and sought experienced mountain men as guides, not only for their knowledge of the trails, but understanding the dangers to look for and avoid. These wagon scouts lead the movement west and helped expand a young nation to the Pacific Coast.

David Wright is a premier artist of the American frontier depicting historical subjects with deeply-researched accuracy and detail. His art captures the epic day-to-day struggles of Colonial frontiersmen and longhunters, settlers and hunters, mountain men and fur traders, Plains and Woodland Indians. His paintings are included in permanent collections of several museums and have been featured in television documentaries, in addition to numerous covers and illustrations for books and magazines. 



Hand forged "Gin Trap" by American Mountain Men brother Mac MacAdams. This piece of functional art made from skillfully hammered steel is of the type depicted in the paintings of John Mix Stanley ("Trappers in a Cabin") and Alfred Jacob Miller (Portrait of "Bill Burrows" and "Trapping Beavers").

Painter Alfred Jacob Miller accompanied Sir William Drummond Stewart to the 1837 Rendezvous held near the confluence of the Green River and Horse Creek, just outside present-day Daniel, Wyoming. After rendezvous they, along with a few others possibly including Bill Burrows, left for the Wind River Mountains on a hunting excursion. This might have been when Miller witnessed the type of trap shown in "Trapping Beavers," and now used as inspiration for the hand forged replica steel trap being auctioned (see painting below).

Mac MacAdams is, among other things, a skilled blacksmith and bladesmith who enjoys making many things. He thrives on tying his love for history, the outdoors, horses and his skill for making things all together and gets the frequent chance to do so as a Wyoming resident and member of the American Mountain Men.

Philip Goodwin was an American painter and illustrator born in Norwich, Connecticut who sold his first illustration at 11-years old to *Collier's* magazine. He provided illustrations and covers for numerous magazines and books specializing in western outdoor scenes with cowboys, Indians, wildlife, hunting, fishing, and the old West. During travels to the West he became good friends with Charles Russell, Carl Rungius, Theodore Roosevelt, and Will Rogers. He is best known for illustrating Jack London's *The Call of the Wild*.

Best known for his depictions of cowboys, soldiers and Native Americans of the legendary Old West, Frederic Remington has long been recognized as a notably influential artist that helped shape the world's perception of the American West. A native of Canton, New York, Remington traveled frequently to the West starting in 1881. His career took off in the mid-1880s when he began crafting illustrations for Harper's Weekly and many other widely-read New York magazines, which brought visual representations of western scenes to an eastern public. Ultimately, he produced over 3,000 signed paintings and drawings in his lifetime, but today he is better known for his sculptures.

In his 1972 painting of rendezvous, John Clymer noted, "the celebrating began as soon as the alcohol could be gotten out of the supply train or off the mules. With whiskey flowing freely there were few dull moments at a mountain rendezvous."

John Clymer was renowned for his art of the history and wildlife of the American West. He received many honors including the National Academy of Western Art's 1976 Prix de West Award and the National Museum of Wildlife Art's Rungius Medal in 1988. (www.clymermuseum.org)

Lot no. Castoro Cellars Selection

The childhood nickname for the owner of Castoro Cellars was "Castoro," which is Italian for "Beaver." The motto for Castoro Cellars, with a wink and a nod, is "Dam Fine Wine." How appropriate for our first wine lot for the Mountain Man Museum. I would suggest the 2013 Petit Verdo to pair with your grilled beaver tail. The winemaker, Tom Myers, has been with Castoro Cellars since their beginning in 1983. He estimates that he has made over 190 million bottles of wine since then. His life is featured in the documentary "Made in Paso" on youtube.com. We would think he knows what he is doing by now, which is why we are offering a variety of his wine craft from organically grown grapes.

Lot no. Lone Madrone Selection

Owner and Winemaker Neil Collins left his home at age 16 to seek his fortune. He was drawn to the food and hospitality industry from the start. When he moved to the United States in 1984, he discovered California wines and knew that was his destiny. Lone Madrone is very much a family business. His sister, wife and two sons all work alongside him, seeking out the best grapes to create his Boudreaux influenced wines. This 2013 Bollo wine is a very dry, very bold Nebbiolo, and would pair well with that grilled beaver tail we talked about earlier. Lot no. Big Cabernet Selection

Our best offering of all the lots. Each of these wineries are powerhouses of Cabernet Sauvignon. Each continually score in the high 90's for their wines. The 2017 Daou Cabernet Sauvignon scored a rare 97 points. Dan Daou grows his grapes on Hidden Mountain Ranch, a mountain renown for its limestone enriched soils as well as the hot days/cool nights temperature swings. The Clayhouse vineyard is named after a 150-year-old adobe farmhouse that remains on the ranch still today. This 2014 bottle was produced during a drought year, and the flavors are intense. Gary Eberle is the rockstar winemaker, earning the 2020 American Legend Wine Star award from Wine Enthusiasts. Cabernet Sauvignon is his flagship wine - the one that made him a star in the wine world. His full-length film, "Full Boar-the Legacy" is on youtube.com. His signature icon of a charging boar gives homage to his German legacy, in which Eberle means "small boar." We truly hope you will savor these Cabernets.

Lot no. White Selection

Why white wine? Web MD says that white wine is full of antioxidants and can promote weight loss. White wine is also one of my favorite wines to cook with and is simply fantastic on a hot summer's day. As an added bonus, if you happen to spill your white wine, it won't stain. Enjoy these white fruit notes of peaches and pears. You won't get that in a red wine.

Lot no. White Pink Red Selection

For those who aren't quite sure what the difference is between White, Pink and Red Wines, this lot is for you. Drink them side by side and you will be astounded by the differences. Try them with food... white is great with fish because it adds a splash of acidity - like squeezing lemon on grilled fish. Pink wines, which tend to be lower in alcohol, balance out the heat in spicy foods, such as Mexican and Indian. Red wines go well with any kind of red meat. The high tannins in the red wine soften the fats in the meat to create more flavor. Don't take our word for it - experiment for yourself.

Lot no. Zinfandel Selection

Zinfandel is thought to be the oldest grape variety that is still used today. It was grown in the Caucasus region, a mountain range between the Black Sea and the Caspian Sea, 8000 years ago. Zinfandel was brought to California is the 1849 gold rush. Back then, wood was very rare, and the Zinfandel grape plant did not need wood trellising. By the 1880's, Zinfandel became the most popular wine grown in California and today is one of the top three grape varietals. These four Zinfandels are from the best Zin producers on the Central Coast. They are all grown on different soils, and you will appreciate the subtle differences between each of them.

Lot no. PasoPort Dessert Wine Selection

We are thrilled to bring PasoPort Dessert Wine to the Rendezvous. Last year, many of you expressed a wish for sweet wines and so we found you the best dessert wines from the Central Coast-Port wines from PasoPort. What exactly is port? Port was developed in Portugal during the time of much sea-going exploration. The winemakers found a way to extend the life of a wine by adding distilled grape spirits to the wine before it finished fermentation, resulting in a sweetness from 10-20% sugar and approximately 20% alcohol. Now you know why these come in small bottles - A little goes a long way. The Angelica is a White Port, aged eight years in barrels and smells of honeysuckle and white peaches. The Late Bottled Vintage Violeta was made with traditional Portuguese varietals, and can be drunk now, or 10 years from now. The California Style is a blend of Zinfandel, Petite Sirah and Syrah, with lots of dark red fruits like raspberry and blackberry aromas. This one won the Best of Class Award at the Central Coast Wine Competition. Do you like the labels? They are all inspired by 1940-50's pin up art.

Lot no. Small to Tall Selection

Size matters. Four bottles to suite your everchanging thirst. A mini-Rosé for the very light drinker, a half bottle of a very nice dessert wine to share over dark chocolate cake, a lovely full bottle of crisp white wine to enjoy on your porch on a hot summer's day, and for the very heavy drinkers here, a double bottle of Cabernet Sauvignon to go with a 54 oz Porterhouse Steak.

Lot no. Sweet Selection

Oh, we know you like your sweet wines. These aren't quite as sweet or as high in alcohol as those port dessert wines. Two of these come from Muscat grapes, which are known for their aromas of orange blossoms. Late harvest wines are made from grapes picked late in the season. Those grapes are tiny little sugar bombs - they seldom can ferment to dryness and therefore are always a bit sweet. Heaven is pairing a late harvest wine with a fine piece of chocolate. Sweet Teeth unite. (sorry, Dr. Josh, DDS)

Lot no. Saxby Half Case Petite Sirah

It's back from last year....here's the other half of that case of Petite Sirah! Did you miss it last year? It's one year older and one year better. Peter Saxby Winery and Vineyard is an award-winning boutique winery in Paso Robles. Their wines are handcrafted in small batches from estate and local vineyards. We are so fortunate to have this half case of Petite Sirah for you to enjoy over and over again. (exactly 6 times). This wine is also quite high in tannins, so your bottles will have a long life in the cellar if you want to save some for later. When you are ready to try this big wine, please let it breathe - a special wine like this needs a little air to develop its best taste potential.



Rocky Mountain Fur Trade Journal

Green River Rendezvous at the Museum of the Mountain Man (Second Full Weekend in July)

- Living history demonstrations by the American Mountain Men
- 35 programs over 4 days
